Dear Mr. Black:

Thank you for your email of May 23, 2024, to Secretary Thomas J. Vilsack, cosigned by your colleagues, regarding the Rangeland Grasshopper and Mormon Cricket Suppression Program in the Cebolla area of Rio Arriba County, New Mexico. Because our Agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) manages the program, the Secretary asked us to respond.

We appreciate your support for U.S. public lands and the Rio Chama watershed. We have reviewed in detail the points you raise regarding the planned—and subsequently canceled—2023 New Mexico grasshopper treatments. We are satisfied we exercised due diligence in planning and preparing for these activities.

As you may already know, on May 30, 2024, USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) conducted this year's final survey in the Cebolla area of Rio Arriba County, New Mexico. APHIS experts determined that there is no need to treat the area this season, because grasshopper population levels are below the eight-per-square-yard baseline threshold.

We continue to evaluate strategies for potential future Rangeland Grasshopper and Mormon Cricket Suppression Program activities.
